



Staying Focused in Lent

Archbishop Charles J. Chaput, O.F.M. Cap. God wants to be loved and in a sense "courted." We need to pursue God as we would persons we love.

Here a few steps - in no particular order - that can help us draw closer to God.

Fifth, seek to be holy. Holy does not mean nice or even good, although truly holy people are always good and often though not always - nice. Holiness means "other than." It's what Scripture means when it tells us to be "in the world, but not of the world." And this doesn't just miraculously happen. We need to choose and seek holiness.



God's wavs are not our ways. Holiness is the habit of seeking to conform all of our thoughts and actions to God's ways. There is no cookie-cutter model of holiness, just as piety can't be reduced to one particular

kind of prayer or posture. What's important is to love the world because God loves it and sent his Son to redeem it, but not to be captured by its habits and values, which are not godly.

Sixth, pray. Prayer is more than just that portion of the day when we advise God about what we need and what He should do. Real prayer is much closer to listening, and it's intimately tied to obedience. God certainly wants to hear what we need and love and fear, because these things are part of our daily lives, and He loves us. But if we're doing the talking, we can't listen. Prayer requires us to lift up who we are and everything we experience and possess to God.

Seventh, read. When we read God's Word, we encounter God himself. But there's more: J.R.R. Tolkien, C.S. Lewis, Georges Bernanos and so many others - these were deeply intelligent and powerful writers whose work nourishes the Christian mind and soul, while also inspiring the imagination. Reading also serves another, simpler purpose: It shuts out the noise that distracts us from fertile reflection.

The Culture of a Cathedral

The monumental growth of the cathedrals was tied to the parallel growth of the cities themselves. The towers of cathedrals stood with those of the palaces of magistrates and burghers to define the city skylines spectacularly. Civic leaders were eager to display the wealth being generated by the economic, technological, and intellectual expansion that was moving across Europe. The result was a morbus aedificandi, a "fever of building," as contemporary chroniclers called it, that led to the creation of 1,587 new churches in France alone during the twelfth century. The Burgundian monk Raoul Glaber (d. 1050) wrote of the Romanesque revolution, "It was as if the world, having thrown off its old garments, desired to dress itself anew in the white robes of the Church. . . . The Christian nations rivaled one another in magnificence, in order to build the most elegant churches. . . . All the religious structures, cathedrals, country churches, and village chapels were rebuilt and transformed into something better."

Basics of Our Faith: Holy Water

There is no limit as to where you can use holy water. You can use it on almost anything, from protecting your family from evil to blessing everyday objects. Here are some of the most common uses of holy water.

- 1. Baptism. During baptism, the priest pours holy water over the person's forehead. This signifies not just their acceptance of Jesus as their savior. It also confers the promises of baptism which includes renouncing Satan and disdaining sin.
- 2. Blessing Mass Goers. Aside from using it to make the sign of the cross before entering the church, the priest also bless Mass goers before and after the mass.
- 3. Blessing the Sick. First of all, blessing the sick is different from the sacrament of anointing the sick. When you bless the sick with holy water, it simply means that you are invoking God's healing presence.
- **4. Exorcism.** Holy water has traditionally been considered a powerful weapon against evil. This is why priests use it to drive out demons during exorcism rites.
- 5. Cleansing of Sins. When you dip your fingers in the holy water basin and make the sign of the cross, it's not just an empty gesture. It symbolizes our desire for God's forgiveness and cleanse ourselves of sin.
- 6. Blessing Yourself. There's no law that says you can't sprinkle holy water on yourself. You can keep it in a small spray bottle that you carry with you.
- 7. Blessing Your Home. This is especially essential for new homes. Holy water can drive out demons and whatever evil forces that may be lurking in your home. You can do it by yourself or ask a priest to do it for you. ~laycistercians.com
